**PFF STATEMENT ON COUNCIL VOTE IN SUPPORT OF SODA TAX**

*Philadelphia, June 9, 2016* – Philadelphians for a Fair Future issued the following statement today in the wake of a vote by City Council’s Committee of the Whole for favorably reporting out Bill No. 160176, the proposed tax on sugar-added and artificially sweetened beverages:

“We congratulate the members of Council for their leadership and courage in moving forward with the beverage tax and positioning it for final vote at Council’s meeting on June 16<sup>th</sup>. Council’s vote is an important step in securing the funds needed to pay for the programs that mean so much to Philadelphia’s future – expanded pre-K, community schools, and rebuilding recreation centers, parks and libraries in our neighborhoods.

“On behalf of the 81 organizations and thousands of citizens that PFF represents, we ask our partners to contact their respective Council members to thank them for moving the legislation forward, and to urge them to ignore the desperation tactics of the soda industry and vote again on June 16<sup>th</sup> to finalize its passage.”
